November Gardening Tips

WEATHER WATCH

The weather for Zone 7 in 2018 continues to be unusual. The Farmer's Almanac predicted the first frost for fall would be around October 30. Keep your eye on the temperature forecast while you continue, to plant, transplant, and clean up around your gardens. Cover tender plants if they are not frost hardy when frost is forecasted. Bring any houseplants indoors for the winter. Plants continue to need about 1" of water each week, so continue to water.

MAINTENANCE

Move unglazed pots to a dry location to prevent cracking. Chop fallen leaves for natural mulch/fertilizer in your garden beds. Deadhead fall blooming perennials. Discard any diseased plant material and compost any that's healthy. Prune dead, diseased, and rubbing branches. Rake fallen leaves off of grassy areas as soon as possible to keep grass healthy. Scatter bone meal on established daffodils.

PLANT

Bulbs, bulbs; fall is the time for planting. Daffodils, hyacinths, crocus and alliums may continue to be planted. November is ideal for planting tulips and lilies. Continue to divide, transplant, and plant perennials.

TIPS

Remove gas from lawn mowers, tillers, mulchers etc. before storing for the winter. Rake magnolia leaves around the tree as they provide natural fertilizer. Take pictures of gardens you would like to redesign next spring. Note existing plant material to keep, and plant material you would like to add next year.

Wyndham Garden Club Received a \$1000 Grant

The Chester Garden Club invites you to enjoy a historic holiday home tour and greens sale of the "Yellow House" at 3001 West Hundred Road, Saturday, December 1st. Tour tickets are \$10.

Think nearly 150 years ago and it is May in the little Village of Chester. A fierce battle is raging outside a yellow house known simply then as the Winfree House. The woman who lives there approaches Colonel William Fowler of the Union troops with a fierce glare in her eyes, walked to the lane fence and, in a tone of voice indicating she was both angry and excited, ordered him to take the guns away and tells him to leave. The sound and blasts from the cannon are breaking the glass panes in the windows of her home. Bullets are flying about. He suggests that she go to her cellar for safety. She persistently refuses and is highly upset. Imagine this spunky woman telling a Union officer to leave and take his cannons with him? Only after the Union officer ran out of ammunition did he leave.

Today, the "Yellow House" is white and very much the same as it was in 1864. The furnishings include beautiful antiques and will feature fresh designs of the Colonial period throughout the house. Greens sold will include swags, wreaths, kissing balls and bows. Parking is conveniently located at the home. We hope you will come!
