# **October Gardening Tips**

"The secret of improved plant breeding, apart from scientific knowledge, is love." Luther Burbank, the developer of the Russet Burbank potato, the most widely cultivated potato in the United States.

#### **PLANT**

- Trees and shrubs, allow time for the roots to establish. This is the best month to plant or transplant boxwood.
- Spring blooming bulbs late in the month; daffodils, crocus, hyacinths, alliums. Arrange bulbs in odd numbers for a natural look and plant mixing heights, bloom time and color.
- Sow winter rye as cover crop for cleaned out vegetable garden.
- Plant tree peonies.

#### **DIVIDE & TRANSPLANT**

- Divide and transplant perennials; daylilies, hostas, iris, coneflower, etc. Divide every 3-4 years to promote growth. Pot extra plants to share with neighbors, friends, and garden club.
- Move deciduous trees & shrubs when they have lost leaves, evergreen trees or shrubs earlier, before they go dormant.

#### **CUT BACK**

- Perennial foliage. For a wildlife-friendly garden, leave stems and seed heads of healthy plants that will provide food and shelter for birds.
- Peony stalks to ground level.
- Discard annual roots to compost pile.

#### **PRUNE**

- Fall flowering shrubs after bloom, and summer bloomers.
- Damaged tree/shrub limbs and discard.

#### **DIG UP**

• Tender bulbs for storage at end of month; dahlias, gladiolas, calla lilies. Allow to dry, then store in peat moss in a cool, sheltered place till next year.

#### **MAINTENANCE**

- Water, weed, mulch, dethatch lawns, compost/mulch leaves and add to soil.
- Discard any unhealthy plant material, limbs, etc.
