November Gardening Tips

Flowers always make people better, happier, and more helpful; they are sunshine, food and medicine for the soul. Luther Burbank

Fall is the ideal time to plant spring bulbs, taking your cues from nature. I have planted bulbs in late September to early December in my Goochland garden. Deciding what variety of bulbs you may want to add and securing bulbs should be your present focus. Whether ordering or visiting nurseries, place purchased bulbs in a refrigerator until planting time.

With this dry and hot fall, planting time can be as late as December. Place markers in areas to add bulbs or make a garden sketch, noting the cultivar, essential for horticulture exhibits. Every few years divide bulb clumps in the fall, replanting or sharing the bulbs. This will improve flower production and expand your floral landscape.

Planting is much like painting, space, width, height, color, density, neutral space, all things to consider. Then add the blooming time of bulbs and you will have a wave of freshness and color for months by researching the bloom times and characteristics of the bulbs you have selected.
