February Gardening Tips

Pruning Basics

February is the perfect month to assess the need for pruning, aiding appearance, health or size, of many trees and shrubs. Late winter, early spring pruning is usually the best time to prune many species as new tissue forms rapidly. Spring blooming trees and shrubs should only be pruned for health at this time. Summer blooming shrubs should be pruned in early spring prior to bud set or immediately after blooming. Roses, evergreens and summer flowering shrubs that bloom on new growth may be pruned. Fruit trees should be pruned while they are dormant. Ideally, try to remove crossing branches, preventing chafing, improving light and airflow. Pruning cuts for dead or diseased branches should be made into healthy wood, below the affected area. Pruning cuts should minimize the plant wounding and speed wound closure. Do not coat pruning cuts with paint or wound dressing.

Evergreen shrubs may be pruned severely, promoting new growth, nicely shaped shrubs and rejuvenation for foundation plantings. Do not be alarmed if the space looks empty for a year or so!

Any spring blooming cuttings can be brought indoors to force blooming!
