# **Horticulture** - Preparing Your Landscape for Winter

Happy Fall! This is the time of the year that we put our gardens to sleep and begin planning for next year. How we prepare our vegetable and flower gardens have a significant impact on next year's yield.

Vegetable gardens benefit from a thick coating (2-4 inches) of organic materials like chopped up leaves and non-diseased plant waste. The addition of lime will counteract the effects of organic decomposition which lowers soil pH thus keeping the soil close to a pH of 7. A heavy application of organic materials will add nutrients to the soil as they decompose. This is a good time to make note of any changes in crop placement. I try not to plant vegetables in the same spot to avoid depleting nutrients.

Flower beds also benefit from the addition of chopped leaves. Remove spent plant materials taking care to discard in the trash any that is fungus and insect infested. Avoid trimming back perennials such as Hydrangeas, ornamentals grasses and Liriope to give the garden structure and form during the winter. Collect seeds from annuals for next year. This is the time to plant your bulbs for early spring color.

This is also the best time to make changes in the landscape that involves planting of shrubs or trees. If they go in the ground in the fall they will have time to establish a strong root system before the spring thus insuring that they will survive summer stress. I also add to my spring bulb collection. This is the time to divide clumps of daylilies and other flowering perennials. Share with friends and neighbors to spread the joy.

Try not to rake up all the fallen leaves because many helpful insects nest in leaf litter. I usually leave a layer of fallen leaves on the ground under trees. Now that the trees are bare this is the time to prune. Your hard work in the fall will be rewarded with vibrant spring blooms and bountiful harvests next summer. ~ Jackie McDonnough, Horticulture Chairman

#### RICHMOND COUNCIL OF GARDEN CLUBS

Minutes of September 1, 2023

The September meeting of Richmond Council of Garden Clubs was held at Ginter Park Presbyterian Church. President Judy Erdman called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. Chaplain Joyce Williams shared a prayer and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Due to time constraints, Sandy McDougall of "Sandy's Plants" was introduced by 2<sup>nd</sup> VP Jane VanDenburgh and the program was presented.

At the conclusion of the program, President Erdman welcomed members and guests. Hospitality chairman Julie Proctor thanked Salisbury Garden Club for refreshments.

Bonnie Parker reported on attendance: 73 members present, representing 40 clubs and 2 guests.

Treasurer Jean Fender reported the balance in the checking account on June 1, 2023 was \$35,918.38 with receipt of \$2,205.09. The balance as of August 30, 2023 was \$36,015.54. The total in the investments account was \$383,816.83. Several clubs have resigned: Wyndham, Westham, Huntington, and Greenfield. Glebe Point has re-joined.

Jean reported that several Habitat for Humanity projects were completed over the summer and she hopes for more information about these project in the future.

Horticulture Therapy reimbursement form was included in the newsletter and clubs will be given up to \$50 per club per fiscal year. Please contact Chairman Shirley Berger for further information.

Tab tops for Ronald McDonald will be collected by Carole Hopkins with help from Elizabeth Moorhouse.

Nature Camp chairman Sandra Walker reported that more contributions came in for camp after the initial ones. These contributions have been sent to Nature Camp.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

2<sup>nd</sup> VP Jane VanDenburgh reminded members that David Pippin has accepted the challenge to create designs using containers, line materials and other components donated by members. The extra vases and components will be sold with proceeds to go to Council to help with funds for pledges, grants, and scholarships.

Jean Fender asked members to check their club information for the new Yearbook which should be ready next month.

Members were reminded that a Memorial service for Gladys Bowles will be held from 2-4 p.m. on September 9 at Laurel Presbyterian church. The recent "Old Dominion Gardener" had an article on Gladys.

President Erdman asked for a volunteer to be Property Chairman. This chairman would be responsible for the padlock key which unlocks the storage area under the stage at Ginter Park Presbyterian church. In this space RCGC stores sound equipment, coffee pots, tablecloths and other items used at meetings.

Jean Fender reported on the Bylaws committee meeting and went over the changes in the bylaws. Jean made a motion to accept the changes and Millie Profitt seconded. Voting members were polled and the motion passed.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:55 a.m.

# Richmond Council of Garden Clubs, Inc. Horticulture Therapy Reimbursement Form

RCGC will give financial assistance to member garden clubs who make flower arrangements for Meals on Wheels, nursing homes, or similar recipients. The following guidelines apply:

- 1) Clubs will be given \$2.00 per arrangement, not to exceed \$50.00 per club per fiscal year.
- 2) Requests for reimbursement are to be made to Horticulture Therapy Chairman after arrangements are completed. Use the application shown below.
- 3) The Chairman will notify Treasurer of the amount of reimbursement to be made and mail or hand out the check at the RCGC meeting.
- 4) RCGC will only make one payment, per fiscal year to a club participating in the Horticulture Therapy project.
- 5) Chairman will keep records of clubs and reimbursement made.
