Chairmen Reports

Spotted Lanternfly: Take Notice and Action

Many of us in the horticulture community know the devastating impact of the spotted lanternfly (SLF), a highly invasive insect that appeared in Virginia in 2018. Sadly, that is not the case for the general public. On a lovely Sunday in mid-July, I was at a track meet on a Lynchburg college campus where these pests were swarming. Although they were making a nuisance of themselves, buzzing around spectators, most people chose to ignore or shoo them away. Frankly, I was shocked! As I tried to squash as many of the SLF as I could others looked on in amusement. I used the opportunity to explain to the people around me that the pretty insects were highly invasive and could potentially damage fruit crops, forested lands, and home gardens.

According to experts, this insect feeds on over 100 plants, including grapes, peaches, hops, and ornamentals. I have since learned that the following cities and counties are quarantined: Buena Vista, Charlottesville, Harrisonburg, Lexington, Lynchburg, Manassas, Staunton, Waynesboro, Albemarle, Augusta, Carroll, Page, Prince William, Rockingham, Rockbridge, Shenandoah, Warren, and Wythe.

A quarantine means that businesses in those areas must obtain a Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS) permit and inspect "regulated articles" before transporting them out of the area. Regulated items include any life stage of the spotted lanternfly, as well as all vehicles and any material or waste that has been outside. CDACS offers inspection training for \$6.

If you have seen a spotted lanternfly in Virginia report your sighting to your local Virginia Cooperative Extension office or online. See the flier from Loudoun County for more detailed information on how to identify the life stages and how to control the spread.

MAYMONT NEWS

Report from RCGC Annual May Luncheon

Spring is in the air at Maymont, and the grounds are alive with frolicking children and picnicking families. The horticulture team is a whirlwind of activity this time of year, between planting, pruning, cleanups, and prepping for the busy wedding and event season. **Of the big projects currently absorbing our attention, the one I'm most excited to share is that we are well along in the process of updating our entire inventory of trees and shrubs using spatial imaging services. In** the near future, guests will be able to come to Maymont, scan a QR code at the entrance, and see a map on their phones with accurate labels for all woody plants. The software even allows us to publish information on the environmental services provided by the plants in our collection, such as carbon sequestration, runoff prevention, and total leaf surface of shady canopy. The summer interns at Maymont, funded in part by RCGC donations, are the main drivers of this project.

The students come primarily from VCU's Environmental Sciences department, and we are working in close concert with VCU faculty to not only ensure quality data, but quality training for the interns, so that they might get real -world chances to learn the skills that are so highly in demand in the industry as we rise to meet the challenges of the 21st century climate crisis.

This year, visitors will begin to see some large-scale construction on the grounds. Maymont was the recipient of a multi-million-dollar grant dedicated to tourism initiatives and will be building new animal enclosures and new pathways designed to increase accessibility. We also will be highlighting the ways in which Maymont's large-scale naturalized areas provide ecosystem services and habitat for native Virginia flora and fauna. As part of the grant, the mansion is receiving a new roof, new HVAC system, and a new fire suppression system. We are grateful that our mission to preserve this slice of American history and this rare green space in the heart of the city resonates with so many people, and thankful for the support of RCGC and all our guests and partners.



RICHMOND COUNCIL OF GARDEN CLUBS ANNUAL MEETING MEADOWBROOK COUNTRY CLUB May 3, 2024

The Annual meeting of RCGC was held at Meadowbrook Country Club. President Millie Proffitt called the meeting to order, and Chaplain Joyce Williams gave the invocation and led the Garden collect. The meeting was dedicated to the memory of President Judy Erdman, 2021-2014. There was a moment of silence for Past President Mrs. Jean Kathleen Cole, 2010-2012. President Proffitt welcomed past presidents Barbara Hollister and Judy Durant and introduced guests, Dr. Philip Coulling, Executive Director of Nature Camp and Mr. Danny Cox, VP of Horticulture at Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden, and designers Kate Vernon and Louise Rucker. President Proffitt thanked those who helped plan the Annual meeting: Millie Proffitt, 1st VP, Jane VanDenburgh, Co-2nd VP, Jean Fender, Treasurer, and Meadowbrook Country Club for hosting the event.

Attendance was given by Bonnie Parker with 71 checked in and 93 expected. A quorum was not needed.

President Proffitt gave her president's report and asked Lee Lythgoe from Ginter Park GC for assistance in a tribute to the officers and chairmen from 2022-2024. The next tribute was to Past Presidents Barbara Hollister and Judy Durant who received rose bushes for their help in "thorny times".

1st VP Millie Proffitt stated that her report was sent by email and could be read online.

Co-2nd VP Jane VanDenburgh stated that their full report was also available by email, but she would give a condensed version highlighting the year's programs and activities.

Recording Secretary Karen Fritter read the minutes of the April meeting. The minutes have been read and approved by three officers and published in the newsletter.

Treasurer Jean Fender gave her report: the balance in checking on April 1 was \$8,758.18 with receipts of

\$11,225.07 and disbursements of \$2,940.53. The balance on April 30 was \$17,042.72. The Money Market account balance on April 1 was \$10,055.45 with interest income of \$38.76 creating a balance on April 30 of \$10,094.21. The total for investments on February 29, 2024, was \$394,501.60.

Jean Fender as Finance Committee Chairman presented the 2024 budget and made a motion to accept the budget as presented. Jane VanDenburgh seconded the motion. The budget was approved as presented.

Attendance chairmen Bonnie Parker and Johanna Gilbert reported an average of 22 clubs at each RCGC meeting with 17 clubs having representatives at every meeting. Attendance certificates were presented to representatives of those clubs.

1st VP, Membership chairman, Millie Proffitt presented a new award to Hanover Towne GC for their 50th anniversary and to Ginter Park GC for their 100th anniversary.

Habitat for Humanity- Jean Fender reminded members that new houses will be available for fall landscaping and funds are available for this project.

Horticulture Therapy- Cheryl Williams gave a report on clubs that have participated and reminded clubs to fill out the form to be reimbursed.

Life Membership- Kay Rafner reported six Life Memberships were given this year and reminded members that all the money goes to Nature Camp.

Recycled Pop Tops- Carole Hopkins reported 101 pounds of aluminum pop tops were collected and given to Ronald McDonald House this year. Clubs were thanked for participating.

School Gardening- Janice Beatty thanked clubs for their donations that totaled \$450. This was added to the \$1000 budgeted by RCGC divided among the four counties participating in educating youth about gardening.

Awards & Grants- Mary Francis Gravitt, co-chair with Jean Fender, reported two applications for the J. Malcolm Pace Award for completed landscape improvement projects. Oxford GC received awards for landscaping at Bon Air Branch Library and the Masonic Temple on Forest Hill Avenue.

President Proffitt introduced Dr. Philip Coulling, Executive Director of Nature Camp, who spoke on the continuing relationship between RCGC and Nature Camp. Many children and adults have enjoyed Nature at Big Mary's Creek because of donations since 2006 of \$36,000. President Proffitt presented a donation to Nature Camp.

Danny Cox, VP of Horticulture at Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden was introduced next, and he shared new and continuing activities coming to the garden plus the expansion of the facilities. President Proffitt presented a donation for Lewis Ginter.

President Proffitt asked that members began preparing for lunch and some remaining business will be concluded during the meal. Chaplain Joyce Williams gave the blessing and Johanna Gilbert began calling tables to go to lunch buffet. Lunch began about 12:00.

President Proffitt summarized the New Location Committee's report and called on committee member, Barbara Hollister, who reported on the Church of the Epiphany as a potential new meeting place. This committee will continue to look at possible new meeting places.

President Proffitt asked Karen Patterson, Hospitality chairman, Midlothian GC, to conduct the Installation of Officers for 2024-2026.
