Philip Couling, Director of Nature Camp, thanked Richmond Council for their donation. Richmond Council is one of 24 organizations which have donated more than \$17,000 this fiscal year. Such charitable contributions are vital in supporting the financial aid program, which this year provided discounts totaling nearly \$42,000 to 55 campers, over 16% of participants.

Total Enrollment was the highest this past summer in nearly a decade.

SEPTEMBER MEETING MINUTES

Richmond Council of Garden Clubs, Inc. Regular Meeting September 6, 2024

The September 6, 2024, meeting of the Richmond Council of Garden Clubs, Inc. at the Church of the Epiphany, 8000 Hermitage Rd, Henrico, VA was called to order by President Barbara Hollister at 10:30 am.

After welcoming members to our new meeting location, President Hollister introduced Mother Kristen of the Church of the Epiphany. Mother Kristen welcomed Richmond Council and thanked us for supporting their diaper ministry. She then provided the invocation.

President Hollister reported that the church has purchased a new projector which is available for our use. Their AV chairperson will assist us with the use of the equipment. He requested that instead of paying him we support their diaper ministry.

President Hollister announced that the agreement for use of the church has been finalized and signed.

President Hollister announced that the Board of Directors voted to recommend to the Council that we hold a Standard Flower Show. Recording Secretary Jane VanDenburgh read the recommendation: "The Board of Directors recommends that Richmond Council of Garden Clubs hold a Standard Flower Show during the Holiday Season in 2025." (Clarification: November or December). The assembly voted to accept the recommendation.

Thomas Jefferson Garden Club was thanked for providing refreshments.

Bonnie Parker, Attendance Co-chair, reported that a quorum is present with 76 members in attendance.

President Hollister introduced the officers and Committee Chairmen:

First Vice Presidents – Cheryl Williams and Mary Penzer

Second Vice Presidents – Jeanne Stigall and Janice Beatty. Jeanne announced that the October speaker will be Brent Heath of Brent and Becky's Bulbs who will present "Bulbs as Companion Plants".

Recording Secretary – Jane VanDenburgh. Today's minutes will be approved by Lynne Still, Millie Proffitt and Mary Wiblin before being published in the next newsletter.

Corresponding Secretary – Susan DelSordo (absent)

Treasurer – Jean Fender. Jean presented her report covering June 1 through August 31, 2024. Account balances as of August 31 are Checking - \$11,807.64, Money Market - \$18,491.70 and Total Investments - \$390,919.38. The complete report is attached and will be filed for audit.

Historian and Ways and Means Chairman – Pat Merson. Plans for Fashions with Flowers 2025 are in progress.

Advisor – Millie Proffitt

Parliamentarian – Sandra Walker (absent)

Hospitality – Karen Patterson (absent) and Julie Proctor. Julie announced that hostess clubs have been arranged for the year. Next month Highland Springs Garden Club will be hostess.

Awards - Judy Durant (absent)

Conservation – Evelyn Klumb. Evelyn asked that member USE LESS PLASTIC. Only 9% of recyclable plastic is recycled. She mentioned several ways of cutting down on the use of plastic.

Finance – Jean Fender (included in Treasurer's report)

Habitat for Humanity – Jean Fender. Jean announced that two of the five Habitat homes being built in Ashland are complete. She will be in contact with clubs regarding landscape needs for these houses. She has plants donated by Karen Patterson to be used if needed.

Horticulture – Jackie McDonnough (absent)

Nature Camp – Lynne Still. Lynne gave a brief overview of what Nature Camp is and read a thank you note from the camper who received the Richmond Council scholarship this year. She thanked the group for their donations.

Properties – Barbara Hollister. Barbara announced that Council owns four pieces of silver, a tray, creamer, sugar and coffee urn. The urn spout leaks, and the Board approved having it repaired which Barbara will attend to.

Protocol – Frances Judd

Recycle Pop Tops – Carole Hopkins. Faye Moran thanked the group for their donations and reminded us to label the bags with the club's name.

School Gardening – Martie Parch. Martie reminded us that the money for school gardening goes to the City of Richmond and four surrounding counties (Chesterfield, Hanover, Henrico, Goochland-Powhatan) Master Gardeners who work with the Youth in their areas. She asked that members encourage their clubs to support School Gardening.

Website Liaison – Jeanne Stigall. Jeanne announced that the website has recently been updated. Club presidents were reminded that they are the conduits for getting the newsletter to the members.

Yearbook – Susie Rothenburg (absent) Yearbooks are available today. Susie was complimented for a job well done.

There being no old business or new business, the meeting was adjourned. Janice Beatty introduced Conner Parrish of Blossoming Roots Flower Farm who demonstrated the creation of a dried flower wreath. The wreath and bundles of flowers were given as door prizes.
