Northam GC is planning to landscape the back or side of the other completed house in Ashland on October 26th.

We were pleased to receive two \$100 Cross Creek Nursery gift cards from a friend of Fran Lecky, who heard her talk about helping habitat projects. One gift card was designated for Habitat and the other for School Gardening. Since we would only purchase plants for Habitat, we are using both cards for Habitat and moving \$100 out of the Habitat Fund to School Gardening. This will be added to the donation we make at our annual meeting.

Let me know if your club is interested in landscaping a Habitat house in the future. There is another house nearing completion, but unsure if it will be ready for landscaping this fall or in the spring. The RCGC Habitat Fund can reimburse up to \$300 per project to the club.

Horticulture

October Gardening Tips

- Plant onions, shallots, and garlic, and sow hardy peas like "Avola' or Meteor. Peg netting down over the beds to protect the seeds from mice and the bulbs from birds.
- 2. Plant daffodils, crocuses, and other spring bulbs, but wait until the end of October or the start of November to plant tulips to reduce disease risk.
- 3. Plant hyacinths and paperwhite daffodils in pots indoors for fragrant winter flowers. Look for bulbs that have specially prepared for indoor growing.
- 4. Fill pots with violas, cyclamens, and other winter bedding plants to give you color through the winter months.
- 5. Plant new shrubs and trees now while the soil is still warm from the summer and move plants that are in the wrong place.

- Lift and divide summer-flowering perennials such as salvias, agapanthus, and hardy geraniums.
- 7. Aerate and scarify your lawn and give it the last cut before winter.
- Cut tall shrub roses down by half to stop them from being damaged by high winds in winter, and prune rambling roses if not already done.
- If at all possible- don't rake leaves from your beds, so overwintering insects will have a place to nest. If you do rake, use leaves to mulch vegetable and flower beds.
- Cut back perennials as they fade but leave a few hollow flower stems and seedheads standing if you can to provide food for birds and homes for overwintering insects.

Veggie Bars By Carolyn Snyder

2 pkg. crescent rolls or crescent baking sheets

2 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened

1 pkg. ranch-style dressing mix 1c. mayonnaise

³⁄₄ c. each finely chopped vegetables: cauliflower, broccoli, carrots, onion (can use less onion if desired)

1 to 11/2 cups finely grated cheddar cheese

Make the bars the day before serving. Press crescent rolls into large, rimmed baking sheet (be sure to press together perforations).

Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool.

While crust is cooling, mix together cream cheese, mayonnaise, and dry ranch dressing mix. Reserve about one-half of the chopped vegetables for the topping and mix the remainder into the cream cheese mixture.

Spread cream cheese mixture over crust when cool. Sprinkle remaining finely chopped vegetables over mixture and press in. Top with cheese and press in again. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Slice into 48 bars before serving.

Richmond Council of Garden Clubs, Inc. Regular Meeting October 4, 2024 Minutes

The October 4, 2024, meeting of the Richmond Council of Garden Clubs, Inc. at the Church of the Epiphany, 8000 Hermitage Road, Henrico, VA was called to order by Co-First Vice President Cheryl Williams at 10:32 am. She announced that President Barbara Hollister is out of state for a funeral.

Chaplain Karla Ogden led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance and offered a prayer as our devotional.

Johanna Gilbert confirmed that a quorum was present.

Presiding officer, Cheryl Williams recognized and thanked Highland Springs and Pamunkey River Garden Clubs for providing refreshments.

She announced that arrangements have been confirmed to hold our May annual luncheon meeting at the Richmond Country Club. A deposit of \$600 has been made for two rooms.

Co-second Vice President Jeanne Stigall presented a brief bio and description of today's program 'Bulbs as Companion Plants' by Brent Heath of Brent and Becky's Bulbs in Gloucester.

Today's minutes will be reviewed and approved by Jane Hays, Mary Penzer and Martie Parch before being published in the November newsletter.

Corresponding Secretary Susan Delsordo announced that the deadline for articles for the next newsletter will be October 11th.

Treasurer Jean Fender presented her report covering September 1 through September 30, 2024. Account balances as of September 30th are Checking - \$10,272.04, Money Market - \$18,522.74, and Investments - \$391,672.06. The complete report is attached and will be filed for audit.

Conservation Chairman Evelyn Klumb reported that there is a new laundry product that will remove microfibers from your clothes as they wash. Google <u>Cora Ball microfiber remover</u> to find an online source and more information.

Habitat for Humanity Chairman Jean Fender reported that two houses are now being landscaped by Sleepy Hollow and Northam Garden Clubs. She has received a donation of two \$100 gift cards to support Habitat and School Gardening. Since School Gardening cannot use the gift card, it will be given to the Habitat fund and another \$100 will be designated for School Gardening.

Horticulture Chairman Jackie McDonnough gave her report covering tips for gardening activities in the Fall. The article will be submitted to the newsletter.

Horticulture Therapy Chairman Cheryl Williams recognized Salisbury Garden Club for making 160 miniature designs for distribution to Meals on Wheels through Central Baptist Church and Ginter Park Garden Club for a design workshop program at the Hermitage where residents are invited to make flower arrangements with four sessions planned. Cheryl encouraged other clubs to be innovative in providing flowers for nursing homes and other facilities. Council will reimburse clubs \$2 for each arrangement up to \$50 maximum.

Life Membership Chairman Kay Rafner reminded members that a life membership is a nice way to honor a club member with the \$50 going to Nature Camp.

Faye Moran substituted for Carole Hopkins, Recycled Pop Tops Chairman, thanking the clubs who brought in pop tops in September and this month. She reminded members to label the bags with the club's name.

School/Youth Gardening Chairman Martie Parch asked members to encourage their clubs to donate to School/Youth Gardening.

We were reminded to give Jeanne Stigall feedback concerning our website.

Jewelry Sale Co-chairman Erica Gilliam urged members to collect costume jewelry for our sale in March which will benefit School/Youth Gardening. The committee will have Christmas jewelry available at the December meeting.

There being no old or new business, the meeting was adjourned at 11 am and Brent Heath gave an informative and entertaining presentation. Numerous members won bulbs or books donated by Brent and Becky's Bulbs.
