Oxford is selling freshly harvested pecans for your holiday baking. If you think you don't need pecans, you need to try the recipe below.

Check out the Christmas jewelry table for a trinket or two to wear or to decorate a special package. Proceeds go to School Gardening. Remember - Cash or Check only.

Juanita's Pecan Cookie Thins

- 2 sticks butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 ½ cups flour
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- ½ tsp salt
- Pecan halves for tops

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs and vanilla. Sift flour and salt. Add to butter mixture. Add pecans and blend well.

Drop by teaspoonfuls onto cookie sheet. Top each cookie with a pecan half. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 – 12 minutes until edges brown. Enjoy!!!

This is the time to plant trees, shrubs and bulbs. Supply water so their roots can start growing before the ground freezes.

- Prune fruit trees, shrubs and other woody ornamentals while they are still dormant.
- Clean up debris to prevent pests and diseases from overwintering.
- Test soil for pH and nutrient levelsget free kits from your local extension office.
- Collect some seeds from vegetables and flowers. Use empty medicine bottles to store. Organize in over door shoe bag for easy access.

Benefits of Choosing Locally Sourced Flowers

I attended a class through Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens at the River City Flower Exchange to learn about locally grown flowers. River City is Central Virginia's first all local flower market. It is a community of eight member farms, three associate farms, and two part-time paid staff.

We met several growers and learned that local flowers can have a more positive effect on your mental and physical health because they are grown with fewer pesticides and fertilizers. Additionally, they are not further contaminated with chemical treatments that are sprayed on imported flowers.

Locally grown flowers are much fresher and last longer because they are usually harvested within 1-3 days of delivery to customers, unlike imported flowers which are packed dry and shipped, and then reprocessed after arrival to designer/retail customer. Local flowers also have more scent because the local scent is not bred out of them.

Local growers use cover crops - like buckwheat and winter rye, field peas and clover - to suppress weeds, rather than using chemicals. They also catch and trap "bad" insects with Companion Plants such as Nasturtiums and attract "beneficial" insects with Alyssum and plants from the Onion family. They also plant Pollinator Strips to provide habitat for birds and other wildlife. And they are also assisted by animals like ducks—which eat snails and slugs - and birds which eat caterpillars and insects.

The local growers are very concerned with soil health and use No-Till/Low-Till methods to preserve a healthy soil web. River City Flower Exchange is located at 3300 W. Broad Street, Suite 106, Richmond. They post a list of available flowers on their website each week.
